




In am proud to be your

In about 10 months time, some of us will be traveling to Orlando, FL for National Convention 2017, and there's no doubt that it will cost a lot if you don't budget carefully. Having attended Natcon 2015 in Lexington, KY, I knew as soon as the last session concluded that no matter what, I would go to the next Natcon. There are no words to encompass my eye-opening experience that summer in Lexington.

I would really like to reach my goals, but they are only possible if we work together. I wholeheartedly understand how difficult it is for some people to reach out to others. That's completely ok.
